28th National Schools Constitutional Convention

From Tuesday 21 March to Thursday 23 March 2023 Neha Prasad from St Mary's Senior High School was among 116 Year 11 and 12 students from around Australia who attended the 28th National Schools Constitutional Convention (NSCC), which was held at the Museum of Australian Democracy at Old Parliament House, Canberra.

The topic for the 2023 Convention was, 'Constitutional Reform - Is section 128 still a necessary requirement to change such an important document as the Australian Constitution?'. This topic provided students with the opportunity to examine Section 128 of the Australian Constitution and discuss if the requirements for alteration are still appropriate. A range of stimulus speakers discussed the issues with the students for them to debate with all delegates.

Outcomes from the Convention will be incorporated into a Communiqué that will be forwarded to the President of the Senate, Senator Sue Lines, for tabling in Parliament and recorded in Hansard. As a national delegate Neha Prasad will travel with 29 other students from their state or territory.

"It has been an honour to not only represent St Marys Senior High but NSW as a whole in the National Constitutional Convention at the Parliament House in Canberra. To speak amongst ministers, university professors, and student delegates from all over the country surrounding the Australian Constitution and referendum opened many doors of networking and connecting with people. I am proud to have been given this opportunity and selected to express my political views and to stand as the only young student from Western Sydney presenting a speech to ministers on the upcoming referendum on Indigenous voice. A lifetime highlight of mine was meeting Prime Minister Anthony Albanese and the honourable Governor General being invited to his home. This opportunity has been a surreal experience that has inspired and motivated my ambitions. It has driven me towards the study of Australian politics and law for my future studies, and career."

Studies of Religion Excursion

On Thursday 16 February 2023, Year 11 and Year 12 Studies of Religion students visited the Auburn Gallipoli Mosque. The aim of the excursion was to introduce the students to Islam for their case study on the religion during Term 1. The excursion was a highly informative learning experience for students about Islam and the daily life of an adherent.

We were given a tour of the mosque and had a Q&A session with Imam Ergun. He talked about the different elements and principal beliefs of Islam relevant for the Preliminary and HSC syllabus. The Iman also explained the symbolism behind the rituals of the Muslim ritual of Hajj performed each year before Eid-ul-Azha. Students were given the opportunity to enhance their knowledge of Islamic beliefs through this informative session.

The architecture of the Auburn Gallipoli Mosque was mesmerising, with Quranic verses and Islamic art traditional to Turkey hand-painted on the interior of the mosque. The students also had the opportunity to donate to the Turkey Earthquake Relief Fund which the mosque had organised.

After the excursion the students were dismissed while some stayed back to enjoy the diverse Middle Eastern savoury and dessert food options in Auburn and engage in further discussion with teachers Dean Newbold and Lauren Hasna.

Geography Excursion

On Thursday 16 March 2023, Year 12 students studying Geography went to Taronga Zoo as part of their study of the HSC syllabus unit "People and Economic Activity".

We were greeted by Austin, a teacher at Observatory Hill Environmental Education Centre who ran us through important HSC Geography skills like mapping and vertical exaggeration. We then got to talk to Alex, a teacher who works with Taronga Zoo Sydney. She gave us a run down of how the Zoo functions as a sustainable business and the important conservation work that the Zoo does. Alex also gave us a tour of the "behind the scenes" work that the Zoo does to keep their display animals healthy in order to generate revenue from tourists and the general public.



Students were also shown the Roar and Snore overnight accommodation in the Zoo as well as the wedding/function centre available. This is seen to be another one of the ways the Zoo is able to generate revenue from tourism, with all profits directed back to the conservation efforts of the team at Taronga Zoo Sydney.

Overall, the excursion was a fun and enjoyable experience for all students involved.

The Jazz Camp Experience

THE CAMP AND WHAT I DISCOVERED...

During the first week of 2023, I had the privilege of attending "Jazz Camp" hosted by Jazz Workshop Australia. This was a 5 day camp held in Katoomba where you get an insight on the different facets of the



jazz genre both as a player and as a listener. There were different classes in the camp including, 'Big Band', which had a similar feel to an orchestra with a big emphasis on horns; 'Combo', a smaller ensemble which focused on improvisation, and 'Masterclass', where musicians went to expand their musical vocabulary on their respective instruments. All of these classes were taught by industry giants of the Australian music scene, such as Dr. Saul Richardson, a world renowned jazz educator and guitarist, and John Morrison, a master percussionist and rhythm savant (in the camp, he is known for the phrase "BEMBE!"). For the first three nights of the camp, students got to watch three professional jazz bands of different experience levels perform. The most notable difference between the bands would be how they would interact with each other and how each member would approach improvisation.



WHAT I LEARNED...

After being surrounded by young musicians from all over Australia and getting advice from the best musicians in Australia, I've learned many things. I've learned about how your instrument contributes to the music that you're playing. Tone is a vital part

about jazz and it can really affect the outcome of the feeling of the music. I've also learned how to approach improvisation depending on the standard that you're playing over, where your "feel" of the song and your instrument is important. But most of all, I learned how to play and cooperate with musicians who have a completely different skill set than myself. Most of the musicians that I worked with either had a classical background, or were much more experienced in playing jazz than I was. To non verbally communicate with other musicians was a skill that was the most difficult to learn. Though it was difficult, I believe it was the main takeaway from this musical experience.

Year 12 Drama students went on an excursion to Belvoir Theatre Company to watch the footage of two archival productions that they are studying for their HSC written examination. Belvoir offers schools the opportunity to view these archives to help the students with writing about the plays in performance to provide experiential evidence in their essay responses. The two plays we watched were *Neighbourhood Watch* by Lally Katz and *Stolen* by Jane Harrison. Both of these texts are studied as part of the core component topic area: Australian Drama and Theatre.

Watching the DVDs allowed the students to pause, discuss and take notes on crucial moments. The theatre staff were very impressed with the level of engagement of our students, as well as their articulate and insightful discussion about the performances and design elements of the production.

Year 12 Powerhouse Museum Excursion

On Friday 31 March 2023, Year 12 students studying Design and Technology, Multimedia and Textiles visited the Powerhouse Museum in Ultimo. Throughout the visit, students had the opportunity to understand the requirements to achieve an outstanding major project as part of their HSC course. It was an informative and fun day to spend with teachers and peers in preparation for major works submissions.

There was an exhibit dedicated to HSC major design projects, where not only were projects on display but QR codes were also provided for the portfolios compiled by past students across Australia. This was an important part of the museum for students to engage with, as it was a clear demonstration of what is to be expected by final submissions. Course outcomes the excursion assisted students to address included:

- Student identifies a need or opportunity and researches and explores ideas for design development and production of the major design project
- Student selects and uses resources responsibly and safely to realise a quality major design project

It was overall a great day to gain insight into innovations within and beyond the HSC course as students had the opportunity to explore numerous exhibits in the museum that assisted with their major works development and personal interests.

On Wednesday 29 March, we saw the launch of the six-session Multiplex Jumpstart Program for female students studying in Year 10 to 12, introducing and encouraging them into the various fields of the built environment. Some of our Year 12 students: Cheriedan Arias, Zaynab Ata, Stephanie Ishac, Georgia McQuillan, Sumayyah Qamar, Princess Torralba and Izabelle Valencia were selected in this program and have enrolled to complete the mentorship program. The initial phase saw our students undertaking a tour and introductory workshop at the once-in-a-generation infrastructure project; Western Sydney International (Nancy-Bird Walton) Airport construction site.



The Jump Start program was introduced to provide a unique, first-hand experience for female high-school students in the construction industry and the opportunity to take site walks on a Multiplex city-changing project. This program's incentive is to broaden assumptions and knowledge of the construction industry, develop personal skills and to connect students with industry professionals within a like-minded environment. This was certainly accomplished for the SMSHS students on the completion of their first session.
