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Principal's Insights



Welcome to the Term 1 issue of South Creek for 2022. I would like to thank the team of students supported by our teacher librarian, Kerri-Anne Brown, for their work in putting together this publication. As a community it is important that we celebrate our achievements together to continue to build upon our strong school spirit and culture.

I would like to thank the school community for their ongoing support throughout the term in responding to the ongoing changes implemented by the New South Wales Government in response to COVID restrictions. As a school community we were extremely fortunate in comparison to other settings that struggled to cover classes. I believe this is due to our entire community's response and their willingness to look after each other.

During Term 1 our school, along with many secondary public schools in New South Wales, embarked on a fundraising project to support the Rivers Secondary College Campuses in Lismore, Vouch for Lismore. This campaign was launched to specifically support students and their families impacted by these devastating floods as there was an awareness that government assistance may be delayed. The college campuses have received over \$65,000 in donations including over 450 vouchers ready to be injected into local businesses as vouchers to use at independent supermarkets and fruit shops. Not only will this money be used to support families, but it will have a multiplier effect within the community. One of the principals emailed me, stating:

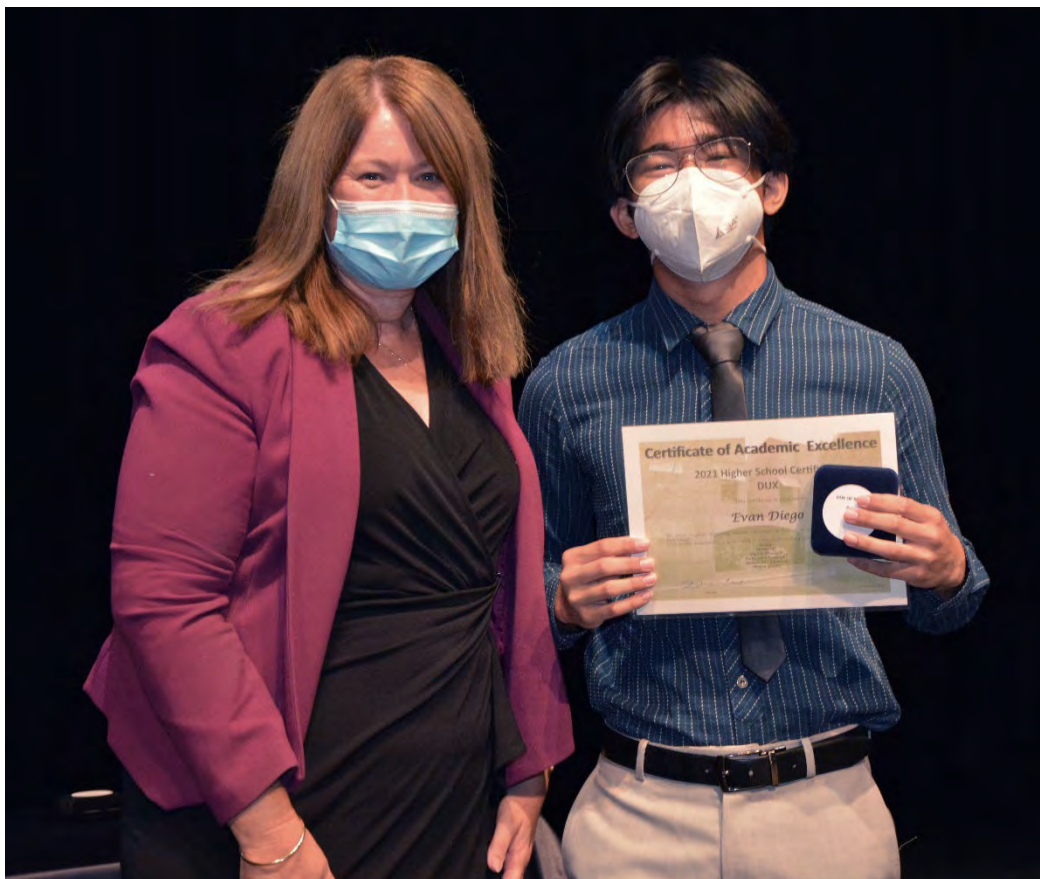
“While official thank you letters and certificates of appreciation are being finalised, please accept our deep thanks and gratitude. For every mufti-day, cake stall, fun run or generous donation, there has been a significant impact in buoying the spirits of our wider school community. These distributed funds are certainly not going to rebuild a house or replace a car, but they do make our families feel valued and recognised.”

St Marys Senior High School hosted an Open Evening on 1 April 2022 to showcase our wonderful school to prospective families. Our student leaders were of course the stars, helping families to navigate their way around the school and sharing their experiences. Many parents commented positively on the tour guides and student faculty leaders.

Term 1 has continued to see our extra-curricular activities increase with SRC and club events, creative and performing arts events, sporting competitions and academic based events which you can peruse throughout this edition of South Creek. Our school is intensely focussed on playing our part in developing healthy young people who have a sense of humour, are kind, loyal, persistent, have a sense of camaraderie and high self-esteem.

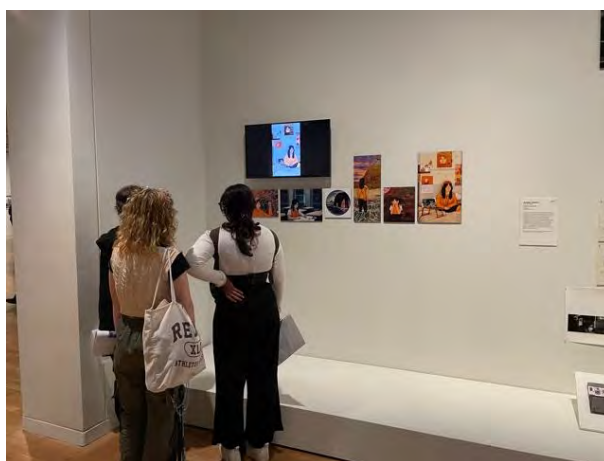




Visual Arts Excursion

After months of COVID-19 restrictions, it was both a literal and emotional breath of fresh air when Visual Arts students were able to go on an excursion to the Art Gallery of NSW on 7 February 2022.

First on the agenda was viewing the ARTEXPRESS exhibition, the annual showcase of exemplary artworks by NSW Visual Arts students for their HSC major work. We were encouraged to write the titles and artists of works we resonated with and how we could develop our practice. Though it was surreal to realise it would soon be our turn to finish our own artworks, seeing the hard work and dedication of the 2021 graduates inspired many of our own ideas. Congratulations to Dave Chua, now a former SMSHS student, for his artwork “*The Ebb and Flow of the Subconscious Mind*” being selected for display in the gallery.



The main event, however, was viewing *Matisse: Life & Spirit, Masterpieces from the Centre Pompidou Paris*. Featuring more than 100 works spanning six decades of Henri Matisse’s career, it is one of the largest single exhibitions of the artist’s masterpieces ever seen in Sydney.

The works ranged from Matisse’s early exploration of Fauvism, featuring bright and pure colours to convey deep emotions, to his later, more serene and distilled designs. It was a rare opportunity to experience the works of such a key figure in 20th century art, and it was a highlight to be able to sit in front of towering stained-glass windows from the *Chapel of the Rosary, Venice* (1948-51) in France.

Despite the excursion supplementing our case studies and major work for the HSC, the opportunity to experience art and culture firsthand was refreshing and uplifting. A big thank you to Sharon and Adam who organised and supervised throughout the day!

PULSE Alive

Participating in NSW Department of Education's PULSE Alive, along with 65 talented singers from SMSHS on 14 February, was particularly special for me because of having participated in something similar when I was in high school. Then, in the 1960s, it was held in the Sydney Town Hall, and was solely a choral program with piano accompaniment. I'm still profoundly grateful for that experience of rehearsals culminating in the magical experience of the sound of a multitude of disciplined voices.

It was a different Sydney this time around, nearly 60 years later, with CityRail trains that you could follow with an app and watch them being cancelled in real time. The Ken Rosewall Arena, replacing the Town Hall of my memory, became the impossibly large rehearsal room where everyone was grateful for a safe place to sit as we rehearsed the program throughout the day. Every participant had earphones that enabled us to listen to the conductor, and a metronome track, vital for being on the beat in that reverberating arena.

What an evening. The program ranged from a dazzling young solo guitarist, though to the astoundingly overwhelming blast and choreography of the NSW Public Schools Millennium Marching Band (first established for the 2000 Sydney Olympics). And throughout the whole evening, dancers wove colour and grace, coordinating with the gasp-worthy lighting design and operation, all of which was served up by VET Entertainment students.

The complexity and execution of this event was a tribute to the key conceivers and organisers, as well as the teachers and students, who gave their all and reaped the reward of knowing that they had. Tess, our indomitable principal conductor, was the embodiment of grace and skill under extreme pressure, and was a model, for every student there, of what leadership looks like.

I was privileged to be amongst the talented students who had been prepared through the groundwork of Fatima and Michael, a dynamic duo if ever there was one. And I very much hope to see a recording of the program to appreciate Ruvarashe Mataranyika's featured singing, which could barely be heard from the wrong side of the speaker array aimed at the audience. Not to forget Philomena Lagman's confident compering and Ashleigh Rodriguez' featured dancing.

Perhaps it was because of COVID, but there was a particular sense of achievement in this program that lifted it beyond the routine extravaganza. Many heaved sighs of relief but there was no denying the positive vibes that pervaded that space, that night.

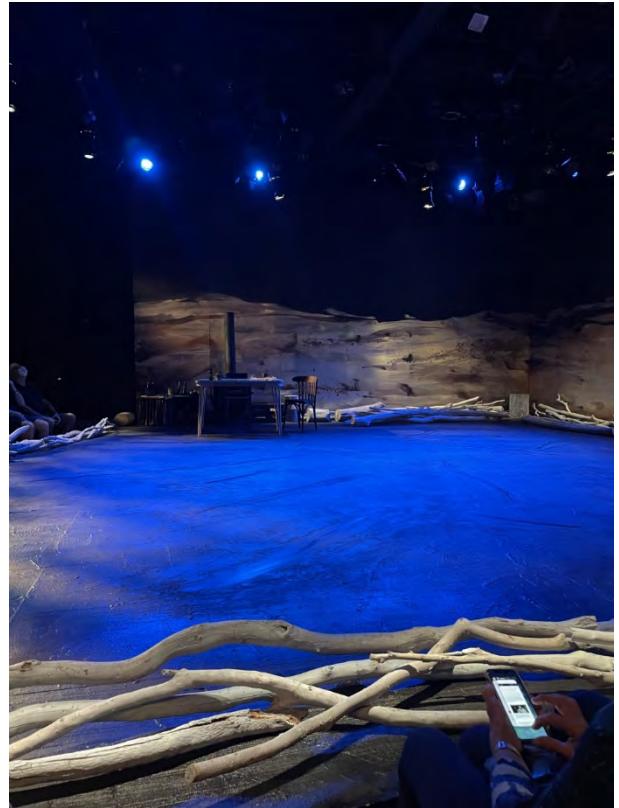
RESILIENCE ARTS PROGRAM
